Also commenting on III%ers....clarification is needed a bit with that one as far as visibility with patches at protests goes, some historical context about them never being violent in canada etc. Based on what I can gather navigating through the emails I know the content of the report is seeking to answer some higher questions and this isn't a criticism at all of the hard work done by Ashley and James under what no doubt have been stressful circumstances but before our unit's name is on something I want to be sure we are giving accurate historical context and a full picture.

I would hesitate to include the appendix with the symbols. All need to be evaluated in context with the exception of the swastika which needs the reference about when it was last seen (since I don't recall it being seen any other time than the first weekend). In addition, Ontario Police officers in the past have been seen with the gadsden flag on their uniform...the meaning is convoluted and needs explanation, context about why it's perceived as being associated with the "far right" etc.

Apologies if I am overstepping here. But maybe we shouldn't rush on trying to put something out considering it appears our reports are now going to so many agencies. I'd like to be able to give some context based on experience if a report is going out that is going to include that content and a full picture of the other grievances displayed at the protest which is why the protests are so controversial, divisive, and have received/continue to receive such widespread support.

Just a suggestion, again..not trying to overstep but just trying to think of what our "value added" can be due to the numerous reports coming from rcmp as well as other agencies.

Neo-Nazis Bring Red Ensign to Minister's Office to Protest Anti-Hate Toolkit - Protesting a toolkit recently released by the Canadian Anti-Hate Network, a handful of greying neo-Nazis gathered outside the constituency office of The Honourable Ahmed Hussen, Minister of Diversity, Inclusion and Youth. Minister Hussen had endorsed the toolkit at its launch. The demonstrators brought Canadian Red Ensign flags with them in protest of a paragraph in the toolkit referring to the flag's appropriation by white supremacists. Several are longtime supporters or organizers on the far-right, including Paul Fromm, Raychyl Whyte, and Gus Stefanis, one-time leader of the now-disbanded neo-Nazi Canadian Nationalist Party. On June 28, CAHN launched Confronting and Preventing Hate in Canadian Schools to help caring adults identify and intervene when a young person is being groomed and recruited by white supremacist movements. Its pages address a series of symbols, language, and subcultures that make up Canada's far-right and racist scene. Included among them was the Canadian Red Ensign. White supremacists see this particular flag as harkening back to a time when Canada was whiter, before multiculturalism was Canadian policy, and celebrating Canada's colonial legacy. Groups such as Blood and Honour and Aryan

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Guard flew the ensign at their rallies and the flag is featured extensively in the propaganda of today's young white supremacists. Many of Diagolon's more public faces have a "Black Ensign," a version of the flag recast in dark camouflage. Jan. 6 panel investigating Trump associates' ties to extremists After members of the far-right Oath Keepers extremist group stormed the U.S. Capitol on Jan 6, 2021, their leader called someone on the phone with an urgent message for then-President Donald Trump, another extremist told investigators. While gathered in a private suite at the Phoenix Park Hotel, an Oath Keeper member says he heard their leader, Stewart Rhodes, repeatedly urge the person on the phone to tell Trump to call upon militia groups to fight to keep the president in power. "I just want to fight," Rhodes said after hanging up with the person, who denied Rhodes' appeal to speak directly to the Republican president, court records say. Federal prosecutors have not said who they believe Rhodes was speaking to on that call, which was detailed in court documents in the case of an Oath Keeper member who has pleaded guilty in the riot. An attorney for Rhodes says the call never happened. The story, however, has raised questions about whether the extremist group boss may have had the ear of someone close to Trump on Jan. 6 — an issue that could take center stage when the House committee that's investigating the attack holds its next public hearing on Tuesday. The Jan. 6 committee has said it is looking closely at any ties between people in Trump's orbit and extremist groups accused of helping put into motion the violence at the Capitol. Top leaders and members of the Oath Keepers and another far-right group — the Proud Boys — have been charged with seditious conspiracy in the most serious cases the Justice Department has brought so far in the

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Jan. 6 attack. Neither federal prosecutors nor House investigators have alleged that anyone in the Trump White House was in communication with extremist groups in the run-up to Jan. 6. Oath Keeper members brought explosives to DC area around January 6 and had a 'death list,' prosecutors say The Justice Department released new details Friday evening of the alleged extensive planning by the Oath Keepers to prepare for violence in Washington, DC, on January 6, 2021, including lessons to conduct "hasty ambushes," a "death list" of Georgia election officials and attempts to acquire homemade firearms. The details, many of which have not been alleged publicly before, were revealed in a court filing from the government, which includes a list of evidence that prosecutors intend to use against the Oath Keepers during their trial in September. - 6. UPS Has New Ghost Gun Shipping Rules That Could Disrupt the Industry Corporate shipping giant UPS has stopped delivering for some American retailers that sell parts for unserialized firearms known as "ghost guns" after pressure from Democrats and the rollout of new federal rules aimed at cracking down on the weapons. A letter from UPS to a Florida business called Ghost Firearms, which sells components to build AR-15-style rifles, was first reported by the Second Amendment Foundation and posted on other pro-gun news sites. The letter warned

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the Daytona Beach-based company that any packages found in the UPS system could be "seized and destroyed" because they "may be violating applicable laws concerning the shipment of 'ghost guns' to unauthorized locations." VICE News verified the authenticity of the letter by speaking with a manager at Ghost Firearms and a UPS spokesperson, who confirmed for the first time publicly that the company has "taken steps to address specific compliance risks" with a new gun policy that affects "a limited number of customers." "UPS's policy now clarifies that the company does not accept any firearms, frames or receivers, or partially complete, disassembled, or nonfunctional frames or receivers (as defined by the new federal regulation) unless those items have been identified and given a serial number in compliance with federal requirements," the company statement said. Firearms industry sources say UPS has sent similar compliance letters to multiple businesses across the country, including some of the largest online retailers of components used to make ghost guns. 9. Sri Lanka protesters say they won't let up until president, PM quit - Leaders of Sri Lanka's protest movement said on Sunday they would occupy the residences of the President and Prime Minister until they finally quit office, the day after the two men agreed to resign, leaving the

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country in political limbo. Thousands of protesters stormed President Gotabaya Rajapaksa's home and office and the Prime Minister's official residence on Saturday, as demonstrations over their inability to overcome a devastating economic crisis erupted into violence. Mr. Rajapaksa will quit on July 13, while Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe also said he would step down to allow an all-party interim government to take over, according to the speaker of parliament. "The President has to resign, the Prime Minister has to resign and the government has to go," playwright Ruwanthie de Chickera told a news conference at the main protest site in Colombo. 12. IRGC Member Killed Under Unclear Circumstances - Iran-based Tasnim News Agency reported Mostafa Mahdovinejad, a member of the Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps

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(IRGC), was killed on Tuesday while "carrying out missions on the resistance front." Tasnim also reported Mahdovinejad was a "defender of the shrine", a common phrase used to describe Iranian military personnel who have fought in Syria and Iraq. While there are no official reports offering more details on Mahdovinejad's death, it's likely he was killed in Syria. The IRGC has maintained a presence in the country since the outbreak of the Syrian civil war and have fought on behalf of the Syrian regime, an ally of the Iranian government. Numerous members of the IRGC have been killed in Syria under different circumstances. The International Labor Organization's (ILO) Beirut office estimates that nearly 100 percent of civil employees are now engaged in permanent or intermittent work stoppages. Last week, air traffic controllers at Beirut's international airport announced they would stop working nights in August, underscoring the severity of a situation that affects everything from courts to schools. The strike has also affected criminal prosecutions and caused delays in processing early releases that might have otherwise shortened jail sentences.

Islamic State in West Africa Province's (ISWAP) prison break in Nigeria's capital shows the insurgency in the northeast is not only far from defeated, but that ISWAP is increasingly capable of executing complex operations in central Nigeria. The freeing of fighters from rival factions leaves ISWAP with an opportunity to either exact retribution against them, or swell their ranks by pressing their adversaries into service. Nigeria's inability to quell ISWAP's insurgency, let alone prevent its most important prison from being attacked, raises serious questions about the effectiveness of the country's institutions and security forces. Implications for the CBSA and Canada

Article 1 provides details on planned far-right protests in the Ottawa region that will occur over the length of the summer. "The protests are kicking off around July 1 and after the arrival of veteran James Topp, who has marched from Vancouver to Ottawa for "freedom," networking with the farright and the Diagolon movement along the way." The ICAP National Security Unit is monitoring the situation and will provide updates if any extremists incidents occur during the protests. (PA)

Article 15 examines the movement, or lack thereof, of far-right foreign fighters to the conflict in Ukraine. "Given the significant presence of far-right fighting units and far-right foreign fighters on both sides of the conflict in Ukraine since 2014, there was concern that the February 2022 Russian invasion might result in large flows of foreign fighters (including right-wing extremists) to farright-linked units on both sides of the conflict. The worry was that this would in turn lead to longterm security headaches for Western countries because of the opportunities for right-wing extremists to build networks and military skills. But four months into the conflict and despite the continued linkages between the far-right in Ukraine and Western countries, these concerns have not materialized. The flow of foreign fighters into Ukraine has been much smaller than anticipated." (PA)

- 1. OTTAWA FACING FAR-RIGHT PROTESTS "ALL SUMMER LONG" The protests are kicking off around July 1 and after the arrival of veteran James Topp, who has marched from Vancouver to Ottawa for "freedom," networking with the far-right and the Diagolon movement along the way. - 2. Libraries in Canada hit by wave of hate, threats, as right-wing groups protest all-age drag events - Family-friendly drag events across Canada, many hosted by municipal libraries, have been targeted by a deluge of hateful comments and threats during Pride month, prompting multiple police investigations and renewed concerns about the safety of the LGBTQ community. More than half a dozen libraries and drag performers, from Saint John to Victoria, reported being inundated

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online and over the phone by homophobic slurs and, in some cases, threats of violence. Drag Story Hour events are popular at many libraries in the country, and usually feature a performer in drag reading children's books about inclusion. They are often held in collaboration with local LGBTQ associations and have caused only minor controversy in the past. Outrage over decision to end U.S. rights to abortion fuels protests in Canada Canadians are taking to the streets this weekend, including in several cities across Quebec on Sunday, to denounce the United States Supreme Court's decision to overturn the law that provided the constitutional right to abortion for almost 50 years. The Quebec Federation of Planned Parenthood is inviting people to meet outside courthouses in Montreal, Quebec City, Sherbrooke, Rimouski and Trois-Rivières, while other protests have taken place across the country since the decision to overturn Roe v. Wade was announced on Friday. Quebec federation coordinator Jess Legault says overturning a right to abortion is worrying and enraging for women's rights and safety. She says although such rights can't be threatened the same way in Canada as abortion is a legal medical procedure, she fears the U.S. decision will fuel the rise of pro-life groups and feed into disinformation around the practice. - 4. Domestic Violent Extremist Activity Likely in Response to US Supreme Court Decision on Abortion - Some domestic violent extremists (DVEs) will likely exploit the recent US Supreme Court decision to overturn Roe V. We expect violence could occur for weeks following the release, particularly as DVEs may be mobilized to respond to changes in state laws and ballot measures on abortion stemming from the decision. We base this assessment on an observed increase in violent incidents across the United States following the unauthorized disclosure in May of a draft majority opinion on the case. (U//FOUO)
- 5. IntelBrief: What the January 6th Committee Hearings Mean for the Future of Political Violence and Domestic Terrorism in the United States - The Capitol insurrection of January 6, 2021 triggered a significant debate as to whether this moment marked the beginning of a more intense phase of political violence in the United States and a decline in the integrity of democratic processes. This instability could be exploited by domestic violent extremists, particularly those influenced by the concept of accelerationism, which holds that all governments are corrupt and thus need to be destroyed. The narratives around the insurrection demonstrate that barriers to entry for using violence to assuage political grievances are lowered when those grievances are perceived as just. "Shall we play the game again?" the Q account wrote in their typically cryptic style on the fringe message board 8kun (formerly known as 8chan). The unexpected return, on the same day that Roe v. Wade was overturned, sent the millions of people who still adhere to the QAnon belief system—which claims there's a cabal of elites working to control the world—into spasms of excitement and predictions that Q's return meant all of their wild predictions were about to come true finally. But experts tracking the QAnon phenomenon quickly discovered that the posting of the new "Q drops" was, at the very least, facilitated directly by the people running 8kun, and possibly written directly by them. But ultimately, to QAnon followers who have spent years suspending disbelief, the details of how the Q drops were posted matter very little. - 8. Norway on highest terror alert after two killed in mass shootings Norway's security service has raised its terror alert to the highest level, saying it believes the suspect arrested after two people were killed in overnight shootings in Oslo is a radicalised Islamist with a history of mental illness. Norway's PST intelligence service said on Saturday that the 42-year-old Norwegian national of Iranian origin had been known to security services since 2015. Roger Berg, the acting PST chief, told a news conference the terror alert was being raised from "moderate" to "extraordinary". He said the attacks were "an extreme Islamist terror act" and that there was "an unresolved terrorist situation". He said intelligence services had spoken to the suspect last month. They did not consider him to have violent intentions but were aware that he had "difficulties with his mental health". When residents opened, he stabbed them, dpa reported. One man died of his injuries right away, one seriously injured man was flown to a hospital, and four other injured people were taken to the hospital by ambulance. It was not immediately clear whether other people were also wounded. Police officers detained a 31-year-old man, whose name was not

- 10. France's Far Right Surges Into Parliament, and Further Into the Mainstream In 2017, after the far-right leader Marine Le Pen and her allies won only a handful of seats in parliamentary elections, she blamed France's two-round voting system for shutting her party out of Parliament despite getting over one million ballots cast in its favor. "We are eight," she said bitterly, referring to the seats won by her party in the National Assembly, the lower and more powerful house of Parliament. "In my opinion we are worth 80." Fast-forward to last week's parliamentary elections. The voting system hasn't changed, but with 89 newly elected lawmakers — an all-time record for her party, currently known as the National Rally — Ms. Le Pen is now beaming. On Wednesday, she hugged her new colleagues, kissing cheeks left and right, before leading them into the National Assembly and posing for a group picture. "You'll see that we are going to get a lot of work done, with great competence, with seriousness," Ms. Le Pen told a scrum of television cameras and microphones. In contrast with "what you usually say about us," she pointedly told the gathered reporters. For decades, dogged by its unsavory past and doubts over its ability to effectively govern, the French far right failed to make much headway in local and national elections even as it captured the anger of France's disillusioned and dissatisfied. During the trial, jurors had heard that a partially constructed 3D-printed gun was found at the home of Hall and his partner Salmon at Hill Top Walk, Keighley. Firearms experts said despite being incomplete, the weapon could have proved lethal if fully assembled. Russian forces conducted unsuccessful ground assaults to the northwest of Slovyansk. Russian forces intensified artillery strikes against Ukrainian positions along the Southern Axis. Despite the efforts of some extreme-right 'influencers,' the 2022 conflict has, for the most part, not energized Western right-wing extremists, nor persuaded them to travel. In what is for Ukrainians a war for national survival and a fight to secure a Western democratic future for the country, the allure of the far-right in Ukraine has dimmed. Ukrainian units with far-right histories are now deeply integrated into Ukraine's armed forces and eschew foreign recruitment, and one of those units, the Azov Regiment, was decimated during the siege of Mariupol. Very few foreign rightwing extremists have been recruited into Ukraine's International Legion. In fact, anecdotal evidence suggests most of the foreign fighters who have traveled this year to fight on the Ukrainian side are fighting to safeguard Ukraine's future as a Western democracy. The fallout of Russia's grain blockade - Lebanon's grinding economic crisis has driven inflation up over the past three years, and the giant explosion at Beirut's port in 2020 destroyed the country's biggest grain silos, hobbling its ability to store wheat. Now, Russia's unrelenting blockade of the Black Sea amid the war in Ukraine – where Lebanon imports more than 60 percent of its wheat – is deepening the Middle Eastern nation's food crisis, upending the lives of families like Khalife's. The shuttering of Ukraine's primary maritime gateway to the world is also turning Lebanon's strife into a portent for what multiple wheat-importing nations might soon face, experts are warning. Moscow has accused Kyiv of mining the waters outside its ports to deter amphibious attacks, while Ukraine has, in turn, blamed Russia for placing the mines. To strangle Ukraine's access to the Black Sea, Russia has also parked warships outside ports that are still under the control of the government in Kyiv. The result: By mid-May, 20 million tonnes of grain were stuck in Ukraine, the world's fifth-largest wheat exporter. The European Union has pitched alternative "solidarity routes" over land. But these can at best offset a fraction of the volumes that would otherwise have travelled through the Black Sea, say analysts. Meanwhile, Ukraine's piled-up grains could reach 75 million tonnes by the fall, the country's President Volodymyr Zelenskyy says – even as the United Nations has cautioned that 49 million people around the world could face famine-like conditions this year. "If the blockade continues, the world will be in a very delicate situation on food security," David Laborde, a senior research fellow at the Washington-based International Food Policy Research Institute told Al Jazeera. "For countries that depend directly on Ukrainian wheat, it could be devastating." Like Lebanon, Somalia – where failed rains are already pushing 7 million people into crisis-level food insecurity – depends on Ukraine for a bulk of its wheat. But with Russia, the world's largest wheat exporter, also struggling to export grains because of the sanctions it faces, multiple countries that count on the Eurasian giants for staples are also vulnerable to hunger, according to analysts. Commando Network Coordinates Flow of Weapons in Ukraine, Officials Say As Russian troops press ahead with a grinding campaign to seize eastern Ukraine, the nation's ability to resist the onslaught depends more than ever on help from the United States and its allies — including a stealthy network of commandos and spies rushing to provide weapons, intelligence and training, according to U.S. and European officials. Much of this work happens outside Ukraine, at bases in Germany, France and Britain, for example. But even as the Biden administration has declared it will not deploy American troops to Ukraine, some C.I.A. personnel have continued to operate in the country secretly, mostly in the capital, Kyiv, directing much of the vast amounts of intelligence the United States is sharing with Ukrainian forces, according to current and former officials. At the same time, a few dozen commandos from other NATO countries, including Britain, France, Canada and Lithuania, also have been working inside Ukraine. The United States withdrew its own 150 military instructors before the war began in February, but commandos from these allies either remained or have gone in and out of the country since then, training and advising Ukrainian troops and providing an on-the-ground conduit for weapons and other aid, three U.S. officials said. 

22. Taliban say they will not interfere with Afghanistan earthquake aid - Afghanistan's Taliban rulers have pledged not to interfere with international efforts to distribute aid to tens of thousands of people affected by this week's deadly earthquake. Even before Wednesday's quake the country was in the grip of a humanitarian crisis, with aid flows and financial assistance severely curtailed since the Taliban's return to power. Abdullah Abed, 65, stands outside his house in Gayan, Afghanistan, where he lost two of his children. The 5.9-magnitude quake struck hardest in the rugged east along the border with Pakistan, as people slept, killing more than 1,000 and leaving thousands more homeless. Aid organisations have complained in the past that Taliban authorities have tried to divert aid to areas and people that supported their hardline insurgency – or even seized goods to distribute themselves and claim the credit.

Hamas Officials Meet Hezbollah Chief Nasrallah, Discuss Strengthening Alliance Earlier this week Hamas officials visited Lebanon in an effort to strengthen its long-standing alliance with Hezbollah. High-ranking officials including Ismail Haniyeh, Salah al-Arouri and Khalil al-Hayya met with Hezbollah chief Hassan Nasarallah and Lebanese political officials. A Hamas statement said the two sides discussed further developing the axis of resistance as a "strategic option" against Israel. Furthermore, political developments and their "repercussions" involving the Palestinian cause were also discussed. Hezbollah echoed much of what was said by Hamas in a statement published after the meeting. Though the communique added the militant organizations backed by Iran were working towards cooperation between "each parts of the axis to serve its central goal, which is related to Jerusalem, its sanctities and the Palestinian cause." The US was represented by Gen Frank McKenzie, the former head of US Central Command, whose area of responsibility was expanded under Donald Trump to include Israel. The unprecedented summit marks the first time Israeli officials have met with such a wide range of counterparts from the Arab world, with the aim of countering the shared threat of Tehran's growing missile and drone capabilities. Israel has no formal diplomatic relations with

To do so, Wagner has cultivated exploitative relationships with multiple African governments—trading military and security services for mining concessions and political access. This article traces the Wagner Group's engagement across Africa, illuminating its nefarious practices, including opaque and manipulative contracts, disinformation campaigns,

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election meddling, and severe human rights abuses. Rebels carry out attack on police station in Benin killing two Two police officers have been killed and another wounded in a rebel attack on a police station in northwest Benin, local media and police sources said, in what appears to be a spillover effect of unrest in neighbouring Burkina Faso and Niger. Fighters descended on the Dassari police station at about 2am local time (01:00 GMT) on Sunday and opened fire, killing two officers before they were pushed back, a police officer who did not wish to be named told Reuters news agency. "Our forces were able to resist. Unfortunately, there were two dead in our ranks," the police officer said. Two "terrorists" were also killed and several others wounded, he added. The local news outlet 24 Heures reported that an officer was injured in the attack. The fighters also set ablaze impounded motorcycles at the station, 24 Heures reported. - 30. Climate change could increase armed conflict in Africa: study A new study suggests climate change could increase the likelihood and duration of armed conflicts throughout African regions. Conducted by INGENIO Institute, a team of researchers with international universities, the study assessed data from 1990 to 2016, identifying a potential correlation between extreme weather events and violence in African communities, factoring in socio-economic characteristics and statistical weather patterns. Its findings, which were published in the most recent issue of the journal Economia Politica, states that rises in temperature and prolonged precipitation both environmental phenomena linked to climate change increases the probability of conflict by four to five times in populations up to a radius of 550 km. "The results we have obtained have farreaching implications for territorial policies on the African continent," Davide Consoli, one of the researchers at the INGENIO Institute, said in a news release. "For example, changes in climatic conditions influence the likelihood of conflict over large areas, which means that the design of climate adaptation policies must consider the particularities of each territory."

1. Accused in Mississauga, Ont. mosque attack now facing terrorism proceedings - A 24-yearold man who is facing several charges in connection with an attack on a mosque in Mississauga back in March is now subject to terrorism proceedings in court, Peel police say. In a news release on Wednesday, Peel police said the Public Prosecution Service of Canada and Ministry of the Attorney General have "consented to the commencement of terrorism proceedings" against Mohammad Moiz Omar. This isn't an instance where police have added new charges — but terrorism proceedings being coupled with the court case will allow prosecutors to potentially pursue tougher sentencing submissions, should Omar be found guilty. Investigators allege that on March 19, Omar entered the Dar Al-Tawheed Islamic Centre in Mississauga and sprayed bear spray towards congregants while brandishing a hatchet.

- 3. Calgary study finds Canada has been targeted with Russian disinformation with tweets linked to foreign powers An analysis of over six-million tweets and retweets and where they originate from has found that Canada is being targeted by Russia to influence public opinion here. The study by the University of Calgary's School of Public Policy found that huge numbers of tweets and retweets about the war in Ukraine can be traced back to Russia and China, with even more tweets expressing pro-Russian sentiment traced to the United States. Assistant professor Jean-Christophe Boucher said in an interview that the Russian "state apparatus" is associated with many accounts tweeting in Canada, and is influencing posts that are retweeted, liked or repeated by different accounts again and again. The tweets commonly express pro-Russian talking points, including that Ukraine is a fascist state or that NATO wants to expand, posing a threat to Russia. - 4. US man charged with attempted murder of Justice Brett Kavanaugh A California man is facing a charge of attempted murder after his arrest near the home of Supreme Court Justice Brett Kavanaugh. Nicholas John Roske, 26, had planned to murder a Supreme Court justice and was armed with a pistol and tactical knife, court documents said. The suspect was taken into custody at about 01:00 local time (06:00 BST). Protection for the justices has been beefed up ahead of a landmark ruling on US abortion rights. While in custody, Mr Roske said he was "upset" about the leaked Supreme Court document on abortion, as well as the recent mass shooting in Uvalde, Texas, according to the affidavit. He said he believed Justice Kavanaugh might issue rulings that would loosen gun control regulations. Jan. 6 U.S. Capitol riot committee goes prime time with probe With never-seen video, new audio and a "mountain of evidence," the House committee investigating the Jan. 6 attack on the U.S. Capitol will attempt to show not only the deadly violence that erupted that day but also the chilling backstory as the defeated president, Donald Trump, tried to overturn Joe Biden's election victory. Thursday's prime-time hearing will open with eyewitness testimony from the first police officer pummelled in the mob riot and from a documentary filmmaker who recorded the melee, and it will feature the committee's accounts from Trump's aides and family members of the deadly siege that put U.S. democracy at risk. The result of the coming weeks of public hearings may not change hearts or minds in politically polarized America. But the committee's investigation with 1,000 interviews is intended to stand as a public record for history. The latest Home Office figures relating to the police's use of powers under the Terrorism Act 2000 show that there were 196 arrests for terrorist-related activity between March 2021 and March 2022. Of those arrested, 15% were aged 18 or under, which equates to 29 teenagers being detained for suspected terrorist offences. In accordance with French court procedure, the prosecutors will then lay out their assessment of the level of guilt of each accused and finally, on Friday, recommend sentencing. In the dock is Salah Abdeslam, the only surviving member of the Islamist hit team that opened fire in the packed concert hall and on cafe terraces in adjacent streets, as well as at the Stade de France sports arena. Also on trial are 19 others accused of various degrees of assistance to the killers. Russian-backed occupation authorities are attempting to set conditions for the political integration of occupied areas into the Russian Federation but are likely acting independently and in an incoherent manner due to the lack of a unifying occupation authority. Russian forces intensified psychological and information operations to degrade Ukrainian morale.

- 11. 3 sentenced to death for fighting on Ukraine's side Two British citizens and a Moroccan have been sentenced to death by pro-Moscow rebels in eastern Ukraine for fighting on Ukraine's side. A court in the self-proclaimed Donetsk People's Republic found them guilty of taking action toward a violent overthrow of power, an offense punishable by death in the unrecognized republic. The extension of Russian infrastructure into the occupied south could allow Moscow to fortify a "land bridge" between Russia and Crimea and build on efforts to claim control through the introduction of Russian currency and the appointment of proxy officials. Fury at UN human rights chief over 'whitewash' of Uyghur repression Dozens of scholars have accused the UN human rights chief of having ignored or contradicted academic findings on abuses in Xinjiang with her statements on the region. In an open letter published this week, 39 academics from across Europe, the US and Australia called on Michelle Bachelet to release a longawaited UN report on human rights abuses in China. The letter, published online, included some academics with whom Bachelet had consulted prior to her visit to Xinjiang. The letter's signatories expressed gratitude for this, but said they were "deeply disturbed" by her official statement, delivered at a press conference in Guangzhou at the end of her six-day tour. They said her statement "ignored and even contradicted the academic findings that our colleagues, including two signatories to this letter, provided". "It is rare that an academic field arrives at the level of consensus that specialists in the study of Xinjiang have reached," the letter said. "While we disagree on some questions of why Beijing is enacting its atrocities in Xinjiang, we are unanimous in our understanding of what it is that the Chinese state is doing on the ground." - 15. Chinese Pilots Sent a Message. American Allies Said They Went Too Far Chinese jets repeatedly buzzed a Canadian plane monitoring North Korea, sometimes coming so close that the pilots could see each other. Hundreds of miles to the south, a Chinese fighter plane sprayed metallic chaff in the path of an Australian surveillance craft, a maneuver that Australia called "very dangerous." To Chinese officials, these were reasonable responses to foreign military patrols that threatened China's security. To the American allies, the Chinese pilots' actions in recent weeks were worrying escalations, risking a midair collision or crash. Such a mishap could trigger a broader conflict. "There are split-second differences between this being a passing headline and this being a major incident with enduring international ramifications," said John Blaxland, a professor of security and intelligence studies at the Australian National University in Canberra. The provocations in the Asia Pacific, and the rhetoric surrounding them, add to the growing tensions as China faces off against the United States and its allies.

No way out as Iraq's dangerous post-election impasse deepens - Eight months after national elections, Iraq still doesn't have a government and there seems to be no clear way out of the dangerous deadlock. Political elites are embroiled in cutthroat competition for power, even as the country faces growing challenges, including an impending food crisis resulting from severe drought and the war in Ukraine. For ordinary Iraqis, everything is delayed. The caretaker government is unable to make crucial electricity payments or draft plans for badly needed investment ahead of the critical summer months. Investments to upgrade water infrastructure have

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been paused while unemployment, water shortages and concerns over food security are drawing public anger. Huge scale and impact of Israeli incursions over Lebanon skies revealed For decades, the roar of Israeli jets, and the hum of surveillance drones have been regular features in the skies above Lebanon, buzzing towns and cities at will and acting as constant reminders that war is never far away. Research, which was published on Thursday, demonstrates just how pervasive that presence has been, with at least 22,000 overflights being documented in the past 15 years alone. Those numbers have made warplanes an abiding soundtrack to Lebanese life and the ever present threat of violence a part of the country's collective psychology. Produced by a new organisation, AirPressure.info, the research shows Israeli planes have occupied the skies of Lebanon for a total of eight and a half of the past 15 years. Few of the incursions are brief, with many lasting an average of four hours and 35 minutes. DRC accuses Rwanda of sending disguised soldiers across border - The armed forces of the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) have accused Rwanda of sending special forces in disguise into the country's territory, marking the latest flashpoint in an escalating dispute between the two neighbours over resurgent violence in its east. DRC's military alleged that 500 Rwandan soldiers had been deployed in the Tshanzu area in North Kivu province, which borders Rwanda, in a statement issued on Thursday. It said the soldiers were wearing a green-black uniform different from the regular Rwandan apparel. The statement also called on the local population to exercise caution as well as denounce anyone seen in such clothing. It added that M23 rebels, allegedly backed by Kigali, had attacked a group of United Nations peacekeeping forces in the Rutshuru area, also in North Kivu, injuring three Tanzanian peacekeepers. The Reuters news agency quoted a spokesman for Rwanda's army as saying the claims were false. Meanwhile, a government spokeswoman told Reuters that Kigali would not respond to baseless accusations. Cybercrime?

Canada's major banks go offline in mysterious hours-long outage

Five major Canadian banks went offline for hours blocking access to online and mobile banking as well as e-transfers for customers. The banks reportedly hit by the outage include Royal Bank of Canada (RBC), BMO (Bank of Montreal), Scotiabank, and the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (CIBC). The cause of the outage is yet to be known but its timing is rather interesting, just days after the Canadian Prime Minister Trudeau invoked the Emergencies Act amid ongoing 'Freedom Convoy' protests.

Red Cross Hack Linked to Iranian Influence Operation?

A network intrusion at the International Committee for the Red Cross (ICRC) in January led to the theft of personal information on more than 500,000 people receiving assistance from the group. KrebsOnSecurity has learned that the email address used by a cybercriminal actor who offered to sell the stolen ICRC data also was used to register multiple domain names the FBI says are **tied to a sprawling media influence operation originating from Iran**.

<u>Terrorism</u>

France, European allies announce military withdrawal from Mali

France and its allies (including Canada) in a European force have announced they will begin withdrawing troops from Mali after nearly 10 years fighting an armed unrest. Emmanuel Macron said that France's bases in Gossi, Menaka and Gao in Mali would be closed within the next four to six months.

"Freedom Convoy"

Anti-hate group links patches on tactical vest seized in Coutts to group founded by Nova Scotian

A tactical vest seized by police this week near the Coutts, Alta., blockade bears the flag of a neo-fascist group founded by Jeremy MacKenzie, a Nova Scotian who allegedly pointed a gun at another man's head last month while drunk on whisky in Cape Breton. Alberta RCMP announced they had charged four people with conspiracy to commit murder, including a man named Chris Lysak. Lysak,

who is from Lethbridge, is one of MacKenzie's known associates, Simons said. He's met, worked out and trained with MacKenzie before, she said, noting MacKenzie has referred to Lysak on social media as Diagolon's head of security.

Money Laundering

Is Malta Destined to be Europe's Next Economic Graveyard?

The negligence and immorality of the Maltese government has facilitated an environment in which tax evasion and money laundering are commonplace. One of the biggest financial scandals in recent memory, which saw the German fintech giant Wirecard toppled by a Financial Times investigation into billions of missing funds from its balance sheet, had roots sprouting from Malta. At the heart of the scandal was the Ndrangheta crime family, a branch of the Italian mafia that filtered funds through a Maltese online casino called CenturionBet. The mafioso group used many of Malta's largest casinos to wipe their ill-gotten gains clean as they diverted EU money, intended to help migrants arriving from Africa, into their own pockets.

Two charged after protesters target home of Nova Scotia's chief medical officer of health

Halifax police have charged two people after three nights of protests outside the home of Nova Scotia's chief medical officer of health. One of the accused, Jeremy MacKenzie, is the founder of the neo-fascist group Diagolon. He's been involved in other COVID-19 protests including the Ottawa occupation.

Cybercrime

Teen Suspected by Cyber Researchers of Being Lapsus\$ Mastermind

Cybersecurity researchers investigating a string of hacks against technology companies, including Microsoft Corp. and Nvidia Corp., have traced the attacks to a 16-year-old living at his mother's house near Oxford, England. Four researchers investigating the hacking group Lapsus\$, on behalf of companies that were attacked, said they believe the teenager is the mastermind. Another member of Lapsus\$ is suspected to be a teenager residing in Brazil, according to the investigators. One person investigating the group said security researchers have identified seven unique accounts associated with the hacking group, indicating that there are likely others involved in the group's operations. Chinese APT Combines Fresh Hodur RAT with Complex Anti-Detection

The Chinese advanced persistent threat (APT) Mustang Panda (a.k.a. Temp.Hex, HoneyMyte, TA416 or RedDelta) has upgraded its espionage campaign against diplomatic missions, research entities and internet service providers (ISPs) — largely in and around Southeast Asia. For one thing, the APT has deployed a brand-new, customized variant of an old but powerful remote-access tool (RAT) called PlugX (aka Korplug), according to researchers from ESET. They named this latest variant "Hodur," after a blind Norse god known for slaying his thought-to-be-invulnerable half-brother Baldr. ESET researchers noted, "Every stage of the deployment process utilizes anti-analysis techniques and control-flow obfuscation."

Ukraine conflict

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IRS unit gets no funds to enforce sanctions on rich Russians

For all of the talk about slapping sanctions on Russian oligarchs, there was a notable omission in the Ukraine aid package approved this month by Congress: An infusion of money for the IRS criminal investigation arm tasked with tracking down the pricey properties of the Russian elite didn't make the cut.
